

INTRODUCTION:

Welcome to a tradition of hope, peace, joy, and faith - the Advent daily devotional presented by Richfield United Methodist Church. You're invited to take in people's creativity as they were invited to explore the theme, "Light of the World." Contributors were asked to prayerfully consider how God brightens the shadow around them. What is an epiphany that sheds new light and gives fresh perspective? Who is the light of God in your life? Consider those questions for your own life, too.

"Light of the World" is also a biblical phrase of many meanings. Jesus uses this phrase to describe himself, proclaiming: "I am the light of the world. Whoever follows me will never walk in shadow, but will have the light of life." (John 8:12) Jesus also uses this phrase to describe the people, proclaiming: "You are the light of the world. A city built on a hill cannot be hidden." (Matthew 5:14) What is it for God on Earth to proclaim himself and us - both as light together? And, while no one is outright proclaimed as "light" in the Nativity narratives of Matthew 2 and Luke 2, we see light in the star that the Magi follow and in the glory of the messengers who share tidings of great joy with the shepherds.

This devotional booklet is assembled with rhythms and patterns to give you tether on your Advent journey. Sundays feature the Advent wreath liturgy for worship as we light the Candles of Hope, Peace, Joy, and Faith. They are inspired by the Psalms of the Advent scriptures for Year B of the Revised Common Lectionary curated by Vanderbilt University (lectionary.library.vanderbilt.edu) and the classic Christmas carol, Angels We

Have Heard on High. You may see some familiar images or turns of phrase from these inspirational sources.

Each week features a mix of prose, poetry, and photography. As with recent devotionals, you'll find a list of suggested daily scripture readings from the Revised Common Lectionary curated by Vanderbilt University

(lectionary.library.vanderbilt.edu). There is no intended connection between the devotional and the readings. Rather, it's an opportunity to do daily thematic scripture reading and know many others around the world join you in reading the same scripture. You're encouraged to share these posts and bless your friends with the creativity of your church.

Before the pandemic, I'd opened the curtains. There was something special about this everyday act becoming an intentional ritual, one that I laced with holy meaning. As we've edged from that time, I continued to open the curtains, though I admit the "specialness" of it had worn away a bit. This fall, however, the holiness of the ritual crept back in for me. I notice it. And for that, I'm grateful.

How can you make an everyday act into a ritual, a daily moment with the Holy Spirit?

Saturday, December 16, 2023 "Lyrics of Advent" by Rev. Wayne Albertson

Many preachers offer a prayer at the beginning of a sermon. It is a recognition of the preacher's humble position speaking of God and matters of holiness in life in the face of the temptations of one's ego in that moment. Most commonly the prayer is from Psalm 19, "May the words of my mouth and the meditations of our hearts be acceptable in your sight, O God". With a different sense of God's leading, I often use verse two of the hymn, "Spirit of God, Descend Upon My Heart" (#500 in the UM Hymnal).

The hymn was written by George Croly, a conservative Church of Ireland clergy in 1867. Verse two addresses our Advent theme this year in these words: "I ask no dreams, no prophet ecstasies, No sudden rending of the veil of clay, No angel visitant, no opening skies, But take the dimness of my soul away." The tune is simple and warm; the words humble and prayerful. We may not think of this hymn as in the same league as our Advent and Christmas carols, but I invite you to let the words settle into a repetitive resource for you in this season. They may well be in harmony with the unspoken prayers of magi, shepherds, and Simeon - about whom we have read and heard.
